



Buy a Slurpee - Save an Eagle

Now you can help animals while you enjoy a taste treat at the same time. Bald Eagles need protected refuge areas for their winter homes. The National Wildlife Federation wanted to buy such an area, where about 300 eagles live in winter. So they asked the 7-Eleven Stores if they would help them raise the money. 7-Eleven promised to give them 1 penny every time they sold a Slurpee drink. That doesn't sound like much, but it adds up. Now 7-Eleven even has special cups for their Slurpees. Each cup has a different endangered animal on it. 7-Eleven's special slogan for this campaign is 'Save a Living Thing'. And that's just what they are doing by donating some of their profit to help buy the eagle refuge. If you want to help the Bald Eagles, try a Slurpee taste treat.


The roosting area refuge is in South Dakota. The Missouri River borders the 835 acre refuge. There's a dam on the river, and water flowing constantly through the dam keeps the river from freezing over. This gives the eagles a chance to catch fish from the river, no matter how cold it gets. And they roost in the big cottonwood trees that grow near the river bank. Many other animals live in this sanctuary, too. You can find this new sanctuary on the map below. It's right where the eagle is on the map.


The Short Kind

ONE BECAME DOMESTICATED AND WAS CALLED "DOG"




In return for wagging his tail a lot... and for chasing off a few stray cats... man got his food for him.

HE WAS CALLED "WOLF"




